

## 2014 GOODS & SERVICES AUCTION



## Marvelous History Corner

### Our Ill-Fated Second Church Building



May Memorial has had five different church buildings. Those interested in a pictorial display of our various church buildings can see them at <http://history.mmuus.org/churchbuildings.pdf>. The second church building on the south corner of Lock Street (now known as State Street) and Burnet Avenue was somewhat ill-fated. Relatively soon after the initial construction in 1843, it was deemed too small for the rapidly growing congregation that was due to Rev. May's increasing popularity. Thus, in the fall of 1850, a decision was made to increase the building's length by 20 feet so twenty-eight pews could be added. A spire was also added to the original tower during this remodeling phase. This latter decision may have added to a subsequent calamity when on February 29, 1852, a huge storm, some even called it a hurricane, came through Syracuse causing the tower and that spire to crash down on the roof (and the house next door) pressing out the side and rear walls and leaving the church a ruined mess. A decision was made soon after to construct a new building (our third building) on the old foundation, of course at great cost and long lasting debt.



Thus, about 161 years ago on April 11, 1853, this third iteration was dedicated "to the worship of God, to the inculcation of Religious Truth and Christian Duty." An original hymn was written for the dedication service by church leader, Dudley Phelps. We don't know the melody, but the message in the first three verses is interesting:

*With hearts depressed, but not cast down,  
 When crushing tempests raged,  
 In earnest faith new hopes to crown  
 Our zealous hands engaged.  
 'Til on those broken walls once more  
 A fairer temple stands;*

*Accept, O God, whom we adore,  
 The offering of our hands.*

*Around this altar which we raise  
 Let thy felt presence be;*

*Here may our prayers and songs  
 of praise*

*Acceptance find with Thee.*

The story of buildings on this site does not end there, though. Three decades later the peace and tranquility usually expected on a Sunday morning was being interrupted by the incursion of railroad tracks. The cute plaster figures we can see at the old train station along I-690 near where our old church stood meant that 130 years ago too much noise and commotion interrupted each weekly service as well as other church activities during the week. Thus, in 1884 a decision was made to purchase the lot on James Street that became the site of our fourth church building.

I am writing to you about two concerns that I have as this fiscal year draws to a close and we embark on the next fiscal year. For the benefits are incalculable*



## Rev. Jennifer's Stewardship Testimonial

I thought writing this month's remarks about stewardship would be easy. It's a no brainer—*Please give money*—it's easy to stay on message. *Changing lives*—that is profound. Lets not gloss over that too quickly. If I was as honest and courageous as I would like to believe that I am, then I would take my shoes off before I enter May Memorial. I would shave my head. I would smudge myself with incense. Because what we DO here is sacred. WE invite the sacred in every time we light the chalice, every time we welcome someone, every time we look into someone's eyes and ask, "*How are you? - no really how are you?*"

I was called into ministry a while ago. It is interesting language. I know other people for whom their jobs are a vocation—artists, doctors, police officers, computer techies, etc. But ministry is the only profession that I know of where it is usual to say that one is "called" into it. "Called" I was because ministry changes lives and I wanted to be part of that.

And make no mistake about it—we may be Unitarian Universalists, with a mild discomfort with traditional religious language, but WE DO MINISTRY. We do change lives. And I see it all the time.

I see children who have grown up in this congregation and have been part of our RE ministry become amazing young adults. It is not uncommon for them to be the voice of reason in their social setting. It is not uncommon for them to be the voice of tolerance in their communities outside of May. It is very common for them to live their UU values and be proud of who they are.

Our youth have been on several service trips. And at this time there is an excitement here about this. I hear from adults who want to know how they can go on a service trip also. Our congregation sees the life changes that have happened because of these trips and the adults want to be part of that.

How many of you take you UU faith quietly out into that world out there—and greet your students, or their parents, your clients or coworkers with a respect and dignity that is made alive by your faith? A faith that is nurtured in this place and most importantly by the people who make up this community. I know the answer and it is all of you.

We do change lives here. The sacred is alive here, and we are helping to change the world.

Who's in? Register and make your room reservations ASAP. I expect it will be a life-changing experience waiting for you a very short day's drive away. Check the UUA website for details.

Often thought of as a blues artist, Smither is a singer-songwriter who draws deeply from the Mississippi Delta, American folk music, Texas swing, and urban ballads to create songs that are weathered, unhurried, and genuinely passionate. Guitar-heads are drawn to his Lightnin' Hopkins/John Hurt derived fretwork; spiritual seekers nod in recognition at the hard-won knowledge casually tossed off in his lyrics, and just plain music fans who have come to him on their own return again and again.
