


CareRing News & Notes

Marvelous History Corner



Our Silver Communion Pieces

Those who were in church on March 30th, for the annual Sam May Day not only heard a wonderful sermon by Dr. Dick Gilbert, but also saw as part of the alter decoration our beautiful silver communion pieces shown in the accompanying photo. **Mary and Bob Burdick** created this display, as they do most Sam May Days. Mary suggested I take a closer look at the pieces and that led to my doing some research and this newsletter article.



It is not clear how old this communion set is, as no purchase date or information could be found in the archives. Those who attended church in the old James Street building may remember seeing the communion pieces on a communion table at the front of the church. I anticipate that in earlier times there were communion services not too unlike what can be found in many churches today, but probably with "Unitarian" touches. **Malcolm Clark** does not remember such services when he attended there as a young man. He said in an email that *"The women's morning group very carefully attended to the silver, but it was not used in my tenure. I remember that John Fuller had a service in our present building that was a communion of sorts. I was so angry, that I left the building and walked around the block to cool off."* I suspect that many of us today would have had a similar reaction.

We do know something about the pieces. All of them are back-stamped showing the manufacturer as Rogers & Brothers of Waterbury, Connecticut. I anticipated that with an internet search it would be easy to find some specific information. I was surprised to find that many silver manufacturing companies used Rogers in their name as various companies on the East Coast, each with their own specific back stamp mark, formed, merged, separated, folded, and absorbed each other. Eventually many of the marks wound up being owned by two major companies, our own nearby Oneida Silver, and the International Silver Company. The stamp on the back of our communion set (shown in the other photo taken of one of the communion set pieces – the actual size of the stamp is roughly 1/2 inch in diameter whereas this photo is enlarged) does not completely match the many, many stamps I could find on the Internet, but it does come close to a couple. It reads from the top "Rogers & Bro Extra Plate Waterbury CT".

Rogers & Brothers was formed in Waterbury by four people, two of whom had the last name of Rogers. Perhaps we can assume our communion service set was manufactured during the period of 1847-1855, the dates of the original company prior to when it was merged with another company, but this is only guess work. Whether our church purchased the set during that period is

another question for which we do not know the answer. If so, that would even predate the construction of the James Street church.

The name "Rogers" actually is a recurring name among American makers of coins, sterling silverware, and silver-plated ware, like our communion set. I even discovered a company in Sheffield, England that has manufactured silver products from 1682 until the present. Perhaps early settlers of our country brought the Rogers name in association with silver manufacturing here. The people who managed the various "Rogers" companies were usually linked by family relationships, but not always. I found one instance where the Rogers & Hamilton Company, also of Waterbury, hired a Cigar dealer named William Rogers and made him secretary so the Rogers name could be used. Gee, I would even have lent my name if asked. 😊




In March, I traveled with friends to Hawaii. There, in a context very different from MMUUS, I chose when to follow, lead, or assert; when to tote my own hiking "essentials", and when to trust in the resources of the group.

It is my custom, when traveling, to send a picture postcard home to myself. I chose a rainbow over Hawai'i's Kohala range. Rainbows connect me not only back to those days of our trip, but to millennia of awestruck, wondering peoples. 

In memory of Nell Hardy

Nell Hardy, who was a member of May Memorial for about 10 years before moving to the Philadelphia area in 2002, died on April 16th, at about 9:00 pm, passing away peacefully.

She was 96; her death followed a brief period of decline, when she stopped eating and drinking liquids; she just let go of life.

We're happy that she was comfortable and did not suffer.

Nell and her husband, Duane Hardy, became members at May Memorial in October of 1992; he died in 2008. They were both passionate Unitarian Universalists, becoming very involved in the congregation.

Both Nell and Duane joined the Unitarian Universalist Church of Delaware County when they arrived in Pennsylvania, and remained members until their deaths.

Nell was a gracious, caring person, liked and admired by all who knew her. She maintained an optimistic and outgoing outlook to the end, staying active and engaged with the world around her.

In addition to her Unitarian Universalist activism, Nell loved opera and all classical music, flowers, square dancing, old friends, old songs, learning new things, travel, and, most of all, spending time with her family and with all those whom she came to know well, finding out how their lives were going and talking about hers.

She was a big fan of Robert Ingersoll, the 19th Century freethinker and orator who was nicknamed "The Great Agnostic."

She was born in Rochester and moved to Syracuse in 1956, where she lived until she moved to Pennsylvania to be closer to family.

Nell donated her body to medical research; we will hold a memorial service for her in the next few weeks at the Unitarian Universalist Church, probably on the afternoon of May 11th.

St. Joseph's Provides Free Community Service



Safe disposal of "sharps," also known as needles, syringes and lancets, is a concern to all members of the Syracuse community. St. Joseph's Hospital Health Center provides a convenient site for the safe disposal of sharps for people with medical conditions that require at-home, self-injections, through the free Residential Sharps Collection Program. **The program takes place on the first and third Saturday of every month from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm at St. Joseph's Emergency Department.**

St. Joseph's accepts used needles, syringes and lancets in clean, biohazard-labeled sharps containers or in clean, plastic bleach or laundry detergent bottles with a screw-on cap. Containers must be leak-proof and sealed to be accepted. Once used, sharps should be put into containers and kept in a place safely away from children and pets. Sharps containers are accepted at St. Joseph's Emergency Department. Call at 448-5173 for more information.
