ve been wondering about something for a

few weeks now. Since the RE calendar has turned to our spring term—Spring! I am already finding myself in need of looking forward to next year. We need to start planning what programming will be offered to the RE children and youth in the next church year. As a part of that process, I'm thinking a lot about what it is that children get out of their experience at May, what do the kids take away with them? So I've been wondering if you've ever stopped to think about what brings you through the door on Sunday mornings?

I know that there are A LOT of options of things for families to do on a weekend, besides going to church. And it's a pretty big undertaking, especially when your children are very little, to get everyone up, dressed, and out the door on time! So there must be something that is feeding your soul, something that makes the morning struggles worthwhile. Is it community? Do you long to spend time with people who share your values and who are happy to see you and talk with you? Is it inspiration? Do you seek a quiet moment to reflect on the big cosmic questions? Are you looking to be changed in some way? Do you want to make a difference in the world? Are you here for the coffee? I hope that whatever it is you are seeking, that you are finding it at May (and that you enjoy the coffee as much as I do). But what about the kids?

Children are a bit different when it comes to why they walk through the door on a Sunday morning. If you ask most of them why they are here, they will say that their parents made them come. Some will say they come for the snack (their version of coffee?). But I think that deep down they are experiencing a fulfillment of needs that they may not even know that they have, or aren't able to verbalize. I'm a little surprised sometimes that there is such an attachment to "joys and sorrows" in the RE classrooms. I would think that they would tire with the ritual, but there is just something special about having a moment to be able to share with others what you are feeling, and to have those feelings acknowledged by your peers and caring grownups. In UU speak, they are acknowledging the worth and dignity in each other and in themselves. That is a powerful experience, even if it does seem like a small gesture. That little piece of their day in RE is just a part of their version of worshiping together. On a typical Sunday they sing together, pass a collection basket, share their joys and sorrows, hear a story with a moral lesson, create something or do something to enrich their learning, and of course share in a small meal together snack time! They are present with each other, they are together in community for those few hours, and they know that we are there for them.

Throughout the history of humankind, people have gathered together for spiritual rituals. They held, and still hold, many different sets of beliefs, but

humans all share that need for communion together. The content of the classes might change next year in RE, but that core focus of being together in a community of faith will remain. Hopefully, even if they don't realize it, and may even complain about "having" to go to church, deep down they will continue to feel supported and accepted as an important part of May's community.




April First Sunday Luncheon


Sunday Offerings for April

The Refugee Resettlement Program



When World Relief, the largest Resettlement Agency in the United States based in Chicago, called InterFaith Works Center for New Americans in February, they shared a story of a family who was resettled in Chicago without any friends or family members. Their brother who had recently resettled his family of 6 in Syracuse said "I need something to make my life worthwhile and meaningful. For the mutual benefit for both families, a journey began. World Relief put the Chicago family on a train bound for Syracuse.

The 4 beautiful faces are the children of the family of 6 who resettled in Syracuse via Chicago last month. Helping them relocate was a community effort. From the Republic of Congo , they started their journey in a refugee camp in Byumba, Rwanda where they had lived for 17 years. With the help of Inter-Faith Works longtime volunteer Pam Suddaby and her friends from Christ Community United Methodist Church, who cleaned and set up the new home, the owner and landlord of the new home whose family decided to rent their family home so others could live safely and share their memories, Plymouth Church who donated a full 2 bedroom apartment which was used for the past year so that their visiting Pastor Anneke and her family from Germany could have a lovely home, and the list continues. It does take a "community".

Center for New American resettles over 500 new friends and neighbors each year. We help with finding a safe new home, furnish their new home with your donations from a dining room table and chairs to share a meal together, dishes pots and pans and small appliances to serve meals, a warm blanket for a good night's rest, small area rugs to help keep them warm in the colder months and a fan to keep them cool in the hot summer.

Winter coats and boots that your children have outgrown and all other sizes to start with, as the winter months approach for next season. (Yes we do think ahead) new or gently used, clean, and with no stains, holes or tears.

The blanket and linen drive, with the goal of collecting 500 blankets, 1,000 sets of sheets and 1,500 towels, is still in full swing as well.

InterFaith Works provides senior companion opportunities for local residents

For more than 20 years, InterFaith Works' Senior Companion Program has been addressing the physical and emotional needs of frail elderly throughout Central New York. The agency recruits and trains approximately 60 Companions who are matched with an elderly client to provide friendship and companionship, alert doctors and family members to potential problems and assist with shopping and meal preparation, among other tasks. Senior Companions are providing thousands of frail elderly with the ongoing support they need to remain healthy and living independently in their own homes. The majority of Senior Companions help clients directly in their homes, while others work in senior day care facilities, assisting their clients with meals, activities, and socialization.

Senior Companion volunteers provide that extra assistance to help adults live independently without living in isolation. Our Senior Companions are a diverse group working with the elderly of all racial, ethnic, and faith traditions.
