Our theme (Soul Matters) for the month of October is Deep Listening.

I wonder if you can recall the last time you practiced deep listening with another person?



This past summer I attended a powerful women's retreat. The retreat was small with 16 participants and 4 facilitators. One of the main themes of the retreat was how important it is to witness and be a witness to others. What is meant by that, is this idea of being deeply present with and deeply listening to those around you. All of us, as humans, are going through many silent struggles and part of the magic of this retreat was that we were all there to witness those struggles and help each other move through them.

There were many moments of emotional release that each of us had at different times and there was always a cloud of witnesses. My biggest emotional release was during meditation one morning when we were asked to picture our inner child. We were told to say to her what we always needed to hear. This is a really soft spot in my soul and at some point, I could not keep my crying quiet. I released this immense sound and many, many tears for that little girl...

Immediately each of the women came over to sit near me, to be beside me, behind me, all around me. One woman sat down right behind me and wrapped her arms around me and just squeezed me. We all sat like that until my sobbing had come to an end It's important to cry it out. It is possibly the most profound experience I have ever experienced.


The power of witnessing, of deep listening, is something that I hope each of us can work on practicing and experiencing together. It does not always have to be some major emotional breakthrough... it can simply be your best friend witnessing you complain until you can complain no more... the power of being with those we love, of helping them to shoulder their burdens, is one of the most important things we can do for one another.





Why were the bank records of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) subpoenaed by the FBI in late 1971?

In October of 1971, the Beacon Press (the publication arm of the UUA) published the Pentagon Papers. The Pentagon Papers contained reports of a secret Department of Defense study of the United States' political and military involvement in Vietnam from 1945-1968. The reports showed that Congress and the public had been systematically lied to about Vietnam for many years.





scure late night subcommittee session, Sen. Gravel read the entire document into the Congressional Record, putting it into the public domain.* Then he looked for a publisher. After dozens of publishers declined to touch the report, the Beacon Press agreed to take on the project. Both the UUA president and the Beacon Press director felt a responsibility to publish the papers, given the Unitarian Universalist commitment to a free and democratic society. Late 1971 saw the publication of The Pentagon Papers: The Senator Gravel Edition (multiple volumes).

President Nixon, who had tried to prevent the publication of the papers, was angry. He verbally attacked Beacon Press and immediately launched an investigation into the financial records of the Unitarian Universalist Association. FBI agents showed up at the Boston office of New England Merchant's Bank with a subpoena for the UUA's financial records, including all contributions made to the denomination from June 1 to October 15, 1971.

In January of 1972, the UUA sought a restraining order to temporarily block the subpoena. UUA president Rev. Robert West warned that the government's inquiry "strikes at the heart of religious freedom" and asked, "What denomination is next?" (NYT, Jan. 12, 1972)

A few months later, the subpoenas were put on hold while constitutional issues were deliberated. In June, the Supreme Court ruled that Beacon Press was not protected by Senator Grave's legislative immunity; however, that same month, the Watergate break-ins were discovered. The UUA investigation was no longer a priority, as the Nixon administration became absorbed by the Watergate scandal.

Around Town in the Time of Covid: Beautiful Baldwinsville

Sharon Turner Cook will be our featured artist during the month of October. She created this show, Around Town in the Time of Covid: Beautiful Baldwinsville,

while facing the isolation of the Covid pandemic and grieving the loss of her beloved youngest daughter. Sharon majored in Art and Education in college, and has been drawing and painting her whole life but, before the pandemic, she hadn't worked in oils in years. Alone and grieving, she felt the need to go back to that medium and, working from her photograph of the Village of Baldwinsville at twilight, she began painting. This first painting inspired her to produce a series of paintings of Baldwinsville based on the places she saw on her walks, or drives taken to get out of the house during the shut-down. During this period of isolation and grief Sharon created beauty.

Let's face the fact of our human mortality together with less fear and more curiosity, with less euphemism and more reality, with less conformity and more creativity.
