I hope that this letter finds you well, warm, and taking some time to rest during this winter season. I am writing to give you details about my upcoming ministry sabbatical

so that we can put your mind and heart at ease in my absence. I will be away from you and from the church beginning February 26th. On August 19th I will move into study leave as I prepare for the new church year; at that time I will be available for emergencies until my return to the pulpit on September 8th.

Sabbatical is a time for my professional and personal rest and renewal, a part of that means being completely away from my work. Therefore, during this time, I will be completely out of communication with all members of the congregation. In my absence, our Board of Trustees, in conversation with Stacy, Glenn, and Teri, will lead this society with joy and love. If something should arise in my absence that they need help with, they will seek help from our UUA Central East Region Primary contact person, Alia Shinbrough. If you have a pastoral emergency, you should contact the church office and Teri will direct you to one of three Ministers who will be on call for pastoral emergencies. These ministers are Rev. Jennifer Hamlin-Navias (retired from FUUS, our former MRE), Rev Douglas Taylor (Minister in Binghamton, son of Rev. Liz Strong), and Rev. Karen Brammer (UU Utica).

The board of trustees have been informed as to what circumstances would warrant their contacting me while away. While I may be informed of certain things, I may or may not respond to any of them, trusting in the leadership of this congregation. This congregation has come such a long way since we have been in partnership together, and I have every confidence that you can all handle what comes your way in my absence.

Sabbatical is a wonderful opportunity for you to experience many other ministers and worship perspectives while I am gone! While I am away, you will continue to see Glenn and Stacy on Sunday mornings supporting our Worship Associates, guest preachers and artists lead wonderful and engaging worship services. My final Sunday with you will be February 25th and my first Sunday back will be September 8th. This will also be our Water Communion homecoming service and I hope to see many of you at both of those services.

My loves, you may not fully understand how much I love you. I am going to miss you all very much while I am away. I am so excited to return rested and renewed so that together we can rise up and grow into the next best version of ourselves so that we might spread the incredible message of Unitarian Universalism.

I love you, and there is nothing you can do about it.

native Tony Trischka is considered to be the consummate banjo artist and perhaps the most influential banjo player in the roots music world, helping to usher bluegrass out of the dusty past and into a progressive future, while honoring the old time traditions. Grammynominated and described as "an absolute master," Bruce Molsky transports audiences to another time and place, with his authentic and personal interpretations of rarities from the Southern Appalachian songbook and other musical traditions from around the globe. The two will trade songs from their prolific and beloved catalogs, as well as the deep well of American traditional folk tunes, both well-known and recently unearthed. # Sam May Sunday



As announced in recent eblasts, April 14, 2024, has been designated as Sam May Sunday. This special Sunday celebrates the legacy of our second minister, Reverend Samuel Joseph May (1845-1868) and honors a present-day activist whose outstanding work in the Syracuse community echoes that of Rev. May.

Rev. Samuel Joseph May was best known for his work to abolish slavery, but he was also involved in every major reform movement of the mid-19th century and was an important figure in the early history of Syracuse. He arrived from New England in 1845 to serve as the second minister of the Unitarian Congregational Society (later May Memorial). He immediately got involved in the community and remained active in Syracuse until his death in 1871. As we think about possible honorees for Sam May Sunday, we want to remind readers of some of Rev. May's important social justice causes, with just a few examples of each.

### **Racial equality and integration**

- Invited a growing black family in his first church to move from the back pew to a larger one in the front, vowing to publicly chastise a resistant parishioner if he insulted the family.
- Raised money to educate formerly enslaved people in the South.

### Equal rights for women

- Advocated for the full participation of women in public affairs.
- Invited women to speak from his pulpit and encouraged other ministers to do the same.
- His 1845 sermon, published as Women's Rights Tract #1, became a key document in the struggle for women's rights.

### **Educational reform**

- In 1848, drafted the resolution establishing the school system for the newly incorporated city of Syracuse.
- Elected to the Syracuse Board of Education in 1865; president from 1866-1869.
- Advocated for public education and for integration of the schools.

### Peace and nonviolence

- Considered war to be "the greatest of all human crimes."
- Openly opposed the Mexican American War, causing him to be criticized in a local paper.
- Played an active role in ending corporal punishment in the Syracuse City Schools.

### Poverty

- Shortly after arriving in Syracuse, helped open a county home for orphaned children.
- Worked for state legislation to house and educate the homeless canal boys

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### Interfaith work

- Worked closely with members of the Temple Society of Concord.
- Collaborated with Rev. Jermain Loguen of the AME Zion Church to assist enslaved people who had escaped.
- Supported Father O'Hara, founder of St. Joseph's Hospital and openly objected to the prejudice shown toward the nuns who staffed the hospital.
- Held community discussions at City Hall that were open to all faiths.

The person who is selected will receive an award and will be invited to speak in the April 14 service and to meet with us in the social hall afterwards. Thank you for your help!

### Unirondack weekend Sept 20-22, 2024

This year's May Memorial UU and UU congregation in Kingston, Ontario, Canada Unirondack weekend will be from Friday, Sept 20, 4 pm through Sunday Sept 22, 2 pm. Other congregations from Central New York are invited to participate as well.

Unirondack is a UU Camp and Conference Center, about a 2.5 hour drive from Syracuse in the western Adirondacks, near Lowville, NY. To see the Unirondack facilities/environment, the website is: <u>www.unirondack.org</u>

Since 2008, this intergenerational Unirondack weekend has been a source of early fall community building for our UU congregations. This weekend is often an introduction to the camp for youth and families who later go on to be campers and staff at the weeklong youth or family camps. Usually, we have room for guests of MM folks, so check in if you want to ask a friend to accompany you to the weekend.

There are cabins and heated sleeping spaces with indoor bathroom facilities. People need to bring their own bedding, towels, and pillows as well as their personal items. People hike, bike, read, play games, go boating, swim, talk, nap, arts, crafts, sport games or just sit by the lake soaking in the beauty. Group activities are encouraged and are led by the weekend participants. Please leave your pets and electronic games at home.

The 2024 cost is expected to be: \$110/PP for those over 12 years old; Children 4-12 years \$100; Children 3 and under are free. Some financial assistance is available to help pay the costs for MM families.

This cost is inclusive of 2 nights (F, S) lodging and use of the Unirondack facilities, Friday night welcome light meal, 3 meals Saturday and Sunday breakfast & lunch. Meals are prepared/cleaned-up by participants and are shared in a dining hall. Special dietary needs are carefully managed in food planning and prep; refrigeration is available for individual needs. Snacks and transportation are not included in this rate. Carpooling has been arranged by individuals in the past.

A 50% deposit is required to hold your space; the balance needs to be paid 2 weeks in advance of the weekend (Sept 6) Full initial payment is totally appreciated! If you need to cancel, usually you will receive a full refund. Reservations can be made by sending your names/ ages of children to Stephanie Cross at <u>mscross1234@gmail.com</u>.
