A Brief Note on May Memorial's Ministerial Internship History

In the archives, we recently we came across an order of service for November 1, 1981, in which the congregation was invited to attend an adult potluck reception hosted by MMUS, First Universalist and Hendricks Chapel. The purpose of the reception was to welcome the new UU Chaplain Intern at Syracuse University.

Newer members may not know that through the years May Memorial has worked with many student ministers. Here is a little piece about that history.

In May of 1971 the trustees of May Memorial established a campus intern program in cooperation with the First Universalist Society of Syracuse. The two congregations would provide living expenses for a UU ministerial student who would work as a chaplain at Hendricks Chapel at Syracuse University (May No One Be a Stranger, 1988, p. 50).

In 1984, the university chaplain program was changed to become a full-time parish program, with a ministerial student appointed to work as an intern at Hendricks Chapel and at either May Memorial or First Universalist, in alternating years. The two local congregations supported the program financially with a subsidy from the New York State Universalist Convention. Reportedly, this was the first intern ministry program of its kind in the denomination. The student ministers were encouraged to assist in the churches while also taking courses at Syracuse University (May No One Be a Stranger, p. 54).

In May Memorial's Historical Tree of Life (2015), former archivist Rog Hiemstra mentioned a number of interns associated with May Memorial from the late 1970s until 1990 and gave a brief update on the ministerial career of each (pp. 103-104). In the 1980s I was a member of the ministerial intern liaison committee. It was a pleasure to serve on that committee because, as an SU professor, I appreciated the cooperation it signified between Hendricks Chapel and the Unitarian-Universalist community in Syracuse.

Going Green and Seeking Social Justice

On January 29th, our service at May Memorial will feature Ms. Oceanna Fair of the grass roots initiative, Families for Lead Freedom Now as a guest speaker. With family members who have lead poisoning, Ms. Fair has first-hand knowledge of the ramifications of this condition. The houses (mostly rental properties), water, and soil in Syracuse contain high levels of lead due to paint, lead pipes and the dust of lead paint from the I-81 corridor going through Syracuse. Since close to 50% of May Memorial's members live in Syracuse, this is an issue that effects so many. Up until 2019, children in Syracuse up to six years of age were tested for lead as part of the WIC (Womens, Infants, Children) program. This has not been reinstated. The Vision of the Families for Lead Freedom Now is: To end childhood lead poisoning caused by our housing, soil, and waters. And, to obtain the necessary resource to make families stronger, healthier, and happier. Come and hear Ms. Fair to learn the story of this organization and how we can learn from this example of environmental justice.

January's Artist – David C. Baxter

The paintings of David C. Baxter will grace the walls of our Social Hall during the month of January.

David states, as an artist, I see beauty in opposites.

The new spring that brings beauty to the ravages of winter; the golden- red leaves as they fall from the tree for the first and last time; the autumn hues of rust covering a hinge whose metal is deteriorating; or the pristine beauty of the snow that is ravaging the tree desperately trying to bear its weight.

Also, opposites like smooth glass as opposed to a highly textured clay vase; the fragileness of an egg against the hardness of steel; the stillness in the air when viewing an incoming storm front; or the old barn that is falling down in a field of tall grass where wild flowers are growing through the openings created by the demise of the barn.

The beauty that coexists within the opposites and the powerful symmetry between them are my focus and what I try to capture with my artwork. I believe that there can be no beauty without some form of destructive opposite. It is a perceived emotion that I can't resist.

To capture these opposites, light and color saturation are the main components I incorporate into my paintings. I prefer mostly to use the soft pastel medium as it is pure pigment, undiluted by the vehicle most other pigments need in order to be applied. The combinations and values of colors are endless. As each layer is applied, the palette constantly changes. The hues are manipulated and combined as the layering process continues. I believe the depth of the colors mirrors the depth of the emotions within the piece, making the base layer as essential as the top layer.
