The poet J. Drew Lanham (you can find him on FB) recently posted the following piece:

"It is like watching a house burn down with friends and family within. We feel helpless as water sprayed -- no matter how much -- does not save the innocent from being consumed, nor keep smoke inhaled and scarring burns from maiming those somehow surviving the conflagration. The thing is, we saw the arsonists pour the accelerant and light the flame, but too many stood silent or

claimed the fire prescribed would cleanse. They, too, in time, will get burned. But for now, we stand by and help to heal the hurt with love and care as soothing salve, where we can. As the fire rages and jumps the line, be advised, prepare for flare-ups. Rake the litter off the lines. Fireproof your heart best you can and live your lives as if joy was essential dousing agent. ### **Financial Support of Our Church**

As May Memorial's 2025-26 stewardship campaign comes to an end, we decided to revisit a 2020 newsletter article about how funds to support our church were raised in earlier times. It may be surprising to learn that in the 19th century, selling or renting pews was a common way of raising money to fund the operation of the church.

When the Church of the Messiah (our second building) was constructed in 1843, part of the \$5000 cost came from the sale of pews. Fifteen years later, that church, which had just been enlarged, was almost totally destroyed by a hurricane. The \$10,000 cost of rebuilding it was raised mainly from an auction of pews, with each successful bidder receiving a "deed of ownership." According to May No One Be a Stranger (1988), pews in the back row were the cheapest. Pews in the front were more expensive, and the most expensive were those in the middle-center section of the church.



In 1869, the tradition of paying for pews was discontinued by our forebears, and

funds to support the church came from voluntary pledges. Ten years later, however, when the church had trouble meeting its expenses, the sale of pews resumed for a time. Pew auctions were later replaced by yearly pew rentals, a practice that was officially abandoned in 1919.

Since that time, funds to support May Memorial have been raised primarily by an annual stewardship campaign, canvas, or pledge drive, with members pledging at levels consistent with their ability to contribute to the operation and upkeep of the church, including the salaries of the minister and other members of the staff.


Congregational Meeting!


