Beloveds, I cannot believe we are already beginning our sixth year together!! What a wild ride we have had through these last five years! I feel so lucky to continue to serve as your minister. I am looking forward to this year together as our board works to vision a future for our congregation, as we, together as a society, figure out how we want to move forward in the world of social justice, to take a congregational vote on adopting the 8th Principle of Unitarian Universalism, to examine our UUA Article II changes, and what it looks like to do some internal work on ourselves during my sabbatical time (among many other things).

At the end of last year, I'm not sure if I clearly communicated that the Committee on Ministry, together with the Board of Trustees completed a thorough review of our shared ministry. My ministry (our shared ministry) is evaluated by the board annually. If you would like to see those evaluations, please reach out to me or the Board of Trustees.

I hope you spent time this summer renewing yourself and your spirit. I hope you spent some time in the sun soaking up the warmth, I hope you spent time in nature, I hope you spent time connecting with those you love. I hope you were able to spend some time on introspection on yourself and your life. This summer I was able to do all of these things and more.

As I hope most of you already know, I will be going on sabbatical beginning in March, 2024, and I will return to the congregation September, 2024 (5 months of Sabbatical, and 1 month of vacation time). During my time away I will be traveling to the country of Tanzania in Africa to work with disadvantaged women and children and doing whatever else is thrown my way. I will also spend time working in Pennsylvania with some of our unhoused population, and taking a week-long spiritual direction backpacking trip somewhere on the east coast. I hope during my time away that you, as a congregation, will spend time talking about who you are and who you want to become. I promise, I will be back, and there is no part of me who thinks that our work together is finished.

Here are a few dates to mark on your calendar: **Sunday September 10th** is our Homecoming and Water Communion Sunday. Please bring some water with you to share in our communal bowl; it is later purified to use for baby dedications and other events for which we need beloved water. The following Sunday, **September 17<sup>th</sup>**, we will have a picnic with First UU (FUUS) at Santaro Park on the west side of Syracuse. MMUUS and FUUS will provide grilling meat (and portobellos mushrooms) and buns. If you are able, please bring picnic side dishes to share and your own place setting(s). The park has an awesome pavilion, nature trails, a water stream (I can show you!), a great playground, as well as a space dedicated for kids to ride their bikes or other wheeled toys. I'm looking forward to all of us being together again!

My loves, I am so thankful to begin this year with you. I cannot wait to see what lies in store for us this year.

Meat, and portobello mushrooms as well as buns (with and without gluten) will be provided for grilling.


Please bring your own place settings and a dish to share.

Michael Field has been a landscape painter and portrait artist for over 20 years. He grew up in Syracuse and was an art teacher in the City of Syracuse Schools for 21 years. Since 2012, he has served as Vice President and then President of the Central New York Scholastic Art Show, which is held annually at Onondaga Community College in January. He considers himself a Romantic Landscape Painter and he states:

"I prefer to paint outside on site (Plein Air), but I also do studio paintings with photographs that I have taken as reference material. I am drawn to water, most of my paintings feature some type of water element in them whether it is a stream, river, lake, or a waterfall. I want to give my paintings a sense of atmosphere, color, and a sense of magic. I want to create an emotional response for the viewer. I want the viewer to feel like they have been to that very spot before or they wish they could go to that place. We live in such a fast-paced society. I am trying to get the viewer just to slow down and appreciate nature. I want my paintings to touch something in your soul."



### Two Awards that Honor Reverend Samuel Joseph May's Legacy



Reverend Samuel Joseph May was the second minister (1845-1868) of the Unitarian Congregational Society of Syracuse. Although best known for his work to abolish slavery, Rev. May was actively involved in every major social justice cause of the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century, including racial equality and women's rights. Rev. May died in 1871, and when the congregation later dedicated its new church building, they called it May Memorial to honor their beloved minister.

It is not surprising that May Memorial has two awards named for Rev. May. This past spring, MMUUS president Don Milmore noted that some members were confusing/conflating the awards. He then suggested that the history committee write a newsletter column about the two awards and how they differ.

According to descriptions of the May Memorial awards given at the end of the church year, the **Samuel Joseph May Citation for Community Action,** which was *established in 1967*, honors *an individual, group or organization* that exemplifies the qualities embodied in Rev. May's work. It is given *periodically* "for actions taken to promote the betterment of the larger community." Recipients have included *individual members and friends of May Memorial* (e.g., Vicky Schipper, Bess Kamerance); *groups* (e.g., Women Transcending Boundaries); and *organizations* (e.g., the Samaritan Center of Syracuse). When given, this award is presented at the annual meeting.

Through the years, many services have focused on Rev. May and his legacy, but it was Rev. Scott Tayler (1997-2004) who made *Sam May Sunday/Sam May Day* into an annual event. He introduced this tradition in 1997 to mark the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Rev. May's birth. Each year an individual whose social justice work echoes that of Rev. May was invited to speak from the pulpit. These special Sundays were meant to celebrate Rev. May's legacy and to honor a speaker whose message would *inspire and challenge the congregation*. After the sermon/lecture was delivered, Rev. Tayler presented the **Sam May Day Award** or **Sam May Sermon Award** to the speaker. A reception was held in the social hall following the service. Most of the activists invited by Rev. Tayler were ministers (UU or other denominations). One, Audrey Shenandoah, was a spiritual advisor for the Onondaga Nation. An album in the archives contains pictures of the speakers, along with excerpts from their presentations. \*

### Going Green and Seeking Social Justice

With supporting measures from the federal Inflation Reduction Act, which provided for financial incentives for sustainable energy improvements, the state of New York has several programs which can help low and middle income qualifiers. These are part of the New York State Energy Research Development Agency offerings.

The EmPower+ New York program.

EmPower+ helps low- and moderate-income households save energy and money toward energy improvements made to their property.

Through EmPower+:

Households can receive a no cost comprehensive home energy assessment to pinpoint where energy and dollars are being wasted and receive a customized plan to lower energy usage.

No-cost direct install improvements identified during the assessment can be installed by participating program contractors.

Households can receive financial discounts on the cost of energy efficiency improvement, such as heat pumps and energy efficient appliances.

# Updated Covid-19 Pandemic Policy Starts Sept 1

This revised Covid Policy assumes we hope to provide worship, education and social activities in person whenever possible while keeping our members, friends and staff as healthy as possible. While the Pandemic Emergency is over, the risk of Covid infection is not.

- Masks are always an option for anyone who feels more comfortable wearing one. Research has
  demonstrated that a good fitting mask can help prevent the spread of Covid and other viruses.
- We ask that if you feel ill or are symptomatic, please stay home.
- If you find that you test positive for Covid within 5 days after attending a May Memorial activity such as Worship, Religious Education, a small group, etc., please inform Teri in the office. She will then send out an email to the congregation letting them know of their possible exposure. She will only share your name if you give her your permission to do so.
- Teri will share the COVIDACTNOW risk information for Onondaga County each week in the eblast, the order of service and on the front door. The risk information at this point is based on Hospital Admissions, and the risks will be listed as low, medium or high.
- When Onondaga County is in low, masking is not required.
- When Onondaga County is in medium, masking is recommended but not required for those aged 2 and older, including while singing.
- When Onondaga County is in high, masking is required for those aged 2 and older, including while singing.
- Masking will not be required while eating and drinking at any level.
- If you or a member of your household has Covid, please follow the CDC recommendations around isolating and masking.

The Board reserves the right to change this policy if significant changes occur.

Adopted by the Board on August 15, 2023.
